Job Gains




The region gained 8,200 nonfarm jobs over the past year, including 5,100 private sector jobs and 3,100 government jobs.

The region's most significant industry is Government Regional Industry Mix, February 2024











Distribution of Capital Region Population by Race/Ethnicity, 2010 and 2020


Capital Region's Diversity Index increased by 42% from 2010 to 2020



Regional Labor Market Developments

Good news

GlobalFoundries was awarded a \$1.5 billion federal grant as part of the U.S. CHIPS and Science Act, the program's largest award announced to date. The funding will go towards a planned expansion and construction of a second computer chip manufacturing plant in Malta (Saratoga County). The \$12.5 million expansion project also includes renovations to GlobalFoundries factory in Essex Junction, VT. Construction will lead to the creation of 9,000 jobs paying union wages. The federal aid package also includes \$1.6 billion in loans and \$10 million for workforce development. Additionally, New York State is offering an aid package valued at \$832 million. It is estimated the second computer chip plant will create 1,500 new jobs at Fab 8 in Saratoga County.

Energy Hardware, a supplier of wind energy components, will be opening a factory at the Glenville Business and Technology Park in Schenectady County. The company distributes electro-mechanical and other components for the energy and aerospace sectors with operations in South Carolina and Florida. The Schenectady County Metroplex Development Authority approved a \$95,000 grant to assist the company with site renovations, which include the installation of loading docks. Upon completion of renovations, Energy Hardware is expected to create 20 new jobs and could create an additional 30 over the next few years.

Update: Organizers for the 2024 Belmont Stakes held a job fair to fill 1,000 positions for the four-day event at Saratoga Race Course this coming June. The Belmont Stakes was moved to Saratoga Race Course this year due to a construction project at Belmont Park in Long Island. More than 400 jobseekers attended the job fair, exceeding expectations. According to the New York Racing Association (NYRA), the job openings mirror those for other events held in the summer, such as the Travers Stake. Available positions include betting clerks, security guards, ushers, cashiers and cleaners.

Bad news

Plug Power recently announced it would be laying off workers in an effort to reduce its financial deficiencies. With headquarters in Latham and a fuel cell manufacturing plant in Bethlehem (both in Albany County), Plug Power has been a fast growing green-energy company. They originally announced a hiring freeze in January, then a few weeks later updated their cost-savings plan to include job cuts. It is unknown how many Capital Region workers will be affected. On March 13th, it was announced Plug Power would be awarded two grants from the U.S. Department of Energy totaling \$75.7 million. It is unknown what immediate effects that announcement will have in the Capital Region are, but the funding will help the company continue its progress in the clean-energy sector.

Albany Academies, the city's oldest private school, will be implementing staff cuts. The K-12 school has experienced a sharp decline in enrollment and is restructuring to reduce expenses. They will no longer offer preschool for children younger than 4 years old, and the pre-K through 4th grade school will no longer be divided by gender. The high school will also be coed, but boys and girls in the middle school (grades 5-8) will continue in separate classrooms. School officials say they plan to cut 13% of the school's workforce through nonrenewal of annual contracts. According to the Times Union, the cuts will include 10 teachers and four teaching assistants.

MVP Healthcare is going through a restructuring which will impact its offices in New York State. The company's headquarters is located in Schenectady (Schenectady County). While the exact number of workers to be let go off has not been directly provided, a company spokesperson stated that, between one Vermont and four New York offices, the restructuring would result in layoffs for 2% of its 1,700 workers.
