

Capital Region Jobs



In April 2024, there were 435,100 private sector jobs and 556,900 nonfarm (private + government) jobs in the region.

Job Gains




The region gained 8,300 nonfarm jobs over the past year, including 5,300 private sector jobs and 3,000 government jobs.

The region's most significant industry is Government Regional Industry Mix, April 2024





Unemployment Rate




The cities of Schenectady, Troy, and Albany had unemployment rates above the State's unemployment rate in April 2024.





Distribution of Capital Region Population by Race/Ethnicity, 2010 and 2020


Capital Region's Diversity Index increased by 42% from 2010 to 2020



Regional Labor Market Developments

Good news

Dimension Fabricators, a producer of reinforcing steel for concrete, is planning an expansion to its facility and workforce at the Glenville Business and Technology Park in Schenectady County. The company will be building an addition to its plant to house new automated manufacturing machinery. They will begin construction in June 2024 with plans to install the machinery in 2025. The company's vice president stated the automated equipment will lead to expansion of work and employment in Glenville.

Update: St. Peter's Health Partners has received state grants totaling \$5 million which will help keep the Burdett Birth Center in Troy (Rensselaer County) open for at least the next five years. In addition to standard operating expenses, the funding will go toward staff training along with partnering with community organizations and doula services to support pre- and postnatal care. St. Peter's had announced the closure of the birthing center last year. Following concerns around transportation and access to local care by low-income residents, they delayed the closure pending an impact study.

Bad news

Comfortex, a manufacturer of window shades and blinds, will be consolidating its operations resulting in the closure of its Capital Region factory. In total, 85 workers will be laid off beginning in mid-July. The plant, located in the Town of Colonie (Albany County), is expected to shutter by the end of 2024. The employees are being offered financial and medical benefits packages and are eligible to seek jobs at other locations, according to a company representative speaking with the Albany Business Review. Comfortex is headquartered in California and has manufacturing facilities in Wisconsin, Texas and Florida.
