In September 2024, there were 439,800 private sector jobs and 559,800 nonfarm (private + government) jobs in the region.

Job Gains




The region gained 6,100 nonfarm jobs over the past year, including 3,200 private sector jobs and 2,900 government jobs.

Regional Industry Mix, September 2024





The city of Schenectady had an unemployment rate above the State's unemployment rate in September 2024.







Distribution of Capital Region Population by Race/Ethnicity, 2010 and 2020


Capital Region's Diversity Index increased by 42% from 2010 to 2020



Regional Labor Market Developments

Good news

Canadian-based water management company Soleno has opened a \$22 million pipe manufacturing facility in Saratoga Springs (Saratoga County). It is the company's first facility located in the United States. Soleno manufactures and distributes sustainable plastic piping and other water management products. In Saratoga, they will be manufacturing a durable pipe product that lasts more than 100 years. Soleno had a grand opening ceremony in September, but employees began work in August 2024. The new facility will create 50 new jobs and operate seven days a week. Empire State Development is supporting the project with \$1.125 million in performance-based Excelsior Jobs tax credits and a \$975,000 capital grant. Soleno is also receiving assistance from the Saratoga County Industrial Development Agency (IDA) and Saratoga Economic Development Corporation.

To help combat the region's nursing shortage, Albany Medical Center is partnering with Russell Sage College on a new program to help incentivize residents entering the field. Nurses who graduate from Russell Sage College and continue employment at any Capital Region acute care center will be offered up to \$9,000 over three years. Albany Medical Center currently has hundreds of job postings for registered nurses. Meanwhile, Russell Sage College says they currently have 300 students enrolled in their Bachelor of Nursing program and 200 enrolled in a Master's program. The initiative will begin in January 2026 for nurses who graduated in December 2024 and worked for a year at a qualifying Capital Region facility.

New York State is looking to build a \$120 million headquarters for the New York Army National Guard's 42nd Infantry Division in Colonie (Albany County). The new facility would replace the current headquarters in Troy (Rensselaer County), which officials say is outdated and too small. The proposed site in Colonie would include a 140,000-square-foot facility with offices for 60 full-time soldiers and 500 part-time soldiers to gather on weekends for training and assembly (according to the Albany Business Review). Albany County would receive economic benefits coming from restaurants, hotels and local businesses hosting National Guard soldiers during training.

Albany Nanotech (Albany County) has received \$4.7 million from the National Science Foundation to operate a workforce development program supporting the computer chip, or semiconductor, industry. NYCREATES, the nonprofit that operates Albany Nanotech, will create the Education Alliance for Semiconductor Experiential Learning, or EASEL. The program plans to attract college students and professors to the campus of SUNY Poly to learn about semiconductor technician jobs. The funding is part of the \$52 billion Chips and Science Act.

Bad news

GE Aerospace, a company that was created after General Electric spun-off its three core businesses, will be laying off 72 workers in Schenectady (Schenectady County) at the end of 2024. The employees worked in administrative positions and remained employed during the transition into the new GE Aerospace company. According to the company, the affected employees had been aware of the upcoming layoff prior to the filing of the WARN notice in September. In a separate news release, GE Vernova announced it will be cutting 900 jobs from its global offshore wind unit. The company has not provided details on which locations will be affected. While GE Vernova has large operations in Schenectady, the offshore wind unit only employs a few workers (according to the Albany Business Review).
