

### **Capital Region Jobs**



In October 2024, there were 441,000 private sector jobs and 563,300 nonfarm (private + government) jobs in the region.



Four industry sectors make up 70% of total nonfarm jobs:

#### Job Gains




The region gained 2,700 nonfarm jobs over the past year, including 900 private sector jobs and 1,800 government jobs.

# The region's most significant industry is Government Regional Industry Mix, October 2024





## **Unemployment Rate**





All of the largest labor force areas in the Capital Region, except the city of Schenectady, had unemployment rates below the State's unemployment rate in October 2024.

# The unemployment rate in the Capital Region decreased over the past year






## Unemployment Rates (Not Seasonally Adjusted), 2014-2024

# October Unemployment Rates, 2014 to 2024









## **Regional Labor Market Developments**

#### Good news

The Albany Nanotech Complex at SUNY Poly (Albany County) will be home to one of three federal labs that will comprise the National Semiconductor Technology Center (NSTC). The Albany NSTC location will be known as the NSTC Extreme Ultraviolet Accelerator. The nonprofit group which operates the Albany Nanotech Complex, NYCREATES, was announced to receive \$825 million to establish the federal semiconductor research center. The Capital Region has been awaiting the announcement since the passing of the \$52 billion Chips and Science Act. Construction has already begun on a new building named NanoFab Reflection to house the facility. The new lab will focus on extreme ultraviolet (EUV) lithography, the most critical and difficult step in advanced chipmaking. NYCREATES plans to add 250 workers to support its operations. The federal entity overseeing the facility will also employ workers at the Albany site. The project is anticipated to create thousands of jobs throughout the Capital Region economy as many industry partners will look to move workers to the area. Construction of NanoFab Reflection is expected to be completed by the end of 2025, as the NSTC's work is expected to begin in earnest.

Kru Coffee, a family-owned roaster, has outgrown its production space in Saratoga Springs (Saratoga County) and plans to build a larger facility in Glens Falls (Warren County). The company operates cafes in both cities and in Burlington, VT. Additionally, they sell roasted beans and cold brew coffee to wholesale customers across the Northeast. Kru Coffee has about 40 full- and part-time workers, with the majority employed at its cafes. They expect to double the production team from four to eight workers over the next year (according to the Albany Business Review).

Pediatric dental practice The Smile Lodge is looking to expand by building a new dental office in Clifton Park (Saratoga County) and has filed applications with the local planning board. The two-story building is estimated to have a total of 15 to 18 medical chairs. Since opening in 2007, The Smile Lodge has experienced large growth, seeing more than 500 patients daily at its Clifton Park and East Greenbush (Rensselaer County) locations (according to the Albany Business Review). The East Greenbush location opened in 2021. The Albany Business Review notes that The Smile Lodge has nearly 200 employees, including 20 dentists and 20 dental hygienists, as well as various clinical assistants, administrative and clerical staff. The new medical center will create similar positions at the growing practice.

#### Bad news

Nordstrom Rack will be closing its retail store at the Colonie Center Mall (Albany County) when its lease expires on February 1, 2025. The retailer filed a WARN notice with NYSDOL and informed its 19 employees of the closure and layoff. NYSDOL Rapid Response staff is using available resources to identify and assist impacted workers. Nordstrom is a NYSDOL Business Services customer.

Pallidus, a semiconductor startup company with offices in Albany, eliminated 37 jobs, or 44% of its workforce, according to the Albany Business Review. The company informed the Albany Business Review of the layoffs, stating most were attributed to its Albany location and were the result of a strategy change — Pallidus is shifting away from making 6-inch silicon wafers in favor of larger units used for computer chips. The announcement came as a surprise to employees, as they received an email the day of informing them of layoffs. Additionally, Pallidus is cancelling a previously planned expansion in South Carolina which would have created hundreds of jobs.
