In September 2024, there were 493,300 private sector jobs and 584,400 nonfarm (private + government) jobs in the region.

Job Gains




The region gained 12,300 nonfarm jobs over the past year, including 9,700 private sector jobs and 2,600 government jobs.

Regional Industry Mix, September 2024







Unemployment Rate by Place, September 2024





Population by Race/Ethnicity, 2010 and 2020





Regional Labor Market Developments

Good news

Oxbo International, a Netherlands-based agricultural machinery manufacturer, has begun construction on a new 195,000-square-foot facility in Bergen (Genesee County). The project, set to be completed by October 2025, will replace the company's existing plant in Byron (Genesee County) and is expected to employ 200 workers once fully operational. Located on a 50-acre site at the Apple Tree Acres Business Park, the new facility represents Oxbo's commitment to maintaining its local presence while expanding its global reach. (rbj.net)

Rochester Institute of Technology (Monroe County) has been awarded nearly \$1.5 million in federal funding to enhance microelectronics education and workforce development. The funding will be used to create an innovative online certificate program aimed at training 555 students across various microelectronics-related educational tracks at both the bachelor's and master's degree levels. This initiative, known as BRIDGE (Broadening Research and Inter-Disciplinary Graduate Education for Microelectronics), aims to address workforce shortages in the microelectronics sector by focusing on education, industry collaboration and student support. The program places particular emphasis on creating opportunities for disadvantaged and underrepresented workers to access new jobs emerging from recent semiconductor industry investments. (rbj.net)

The GLOW With Your Hands: Manufacturing event recently brought together over 1,000 students from 30 school districts across the GLOW region (Genesee, Livingston, Orleans and Wyoming counties) at the Genesee County Fairgrounds. This hands-on workforce event provided students with the opportunity to explore various career paths in advanced manufacturing, agriculture, food production and skilled trades. More than 70 businesses participated, offering interactive activities and simulations to showcase potential career opportunities. (rbj.net)

Bad news

R.P. Fedder Industrial LLC, a Rochester-based (Monroe County) manufacturer of air filtration solutions, has announced plans to lay off half of its local workforce. The company, which was acquired by Chicago-based Rensa Filtration in 2023, will reduce staff at its Driving Park Avenue location by up to 25 employees between December 6 and 20, 2024. This restructuring comes as part of the company's integration with its parent company, Rensa Filtration, and marks a significant change for the 65-year-old business that has long served major local corporations like Eastman Kodak and Xerox. Other news

Anthony Jordan Health Corp. has successfully negotiated a new three-year contract with 1199SEIU United Healthcare Workers East, which represents about 20% of its workforce. The agreement includes a 12% wage increase phased over three years, enhanced vacation and sick leave and fully covered healthcare benefits. Over 40 clinic-based healthcare workers from various Jordan Health facilities ratified the contract, which aims to improve recruitment and retention in Rochester's underserved communities.
