

Southern Tier Jobs



In November 2024, there were 216,500 private sector jobs and 274,200 nonfarm (private + government) jobs in the region.

Job Gains




The region gained 500 nonfarm jobs over the past year, with a gain of 1,700 government jobs offset by a loss of 1,200 private sector jobs.

Regional Industry Mix, November 2024





Unemployment Rate




All of the largest labor force areas in the Southern Tier Region, except the city of Elmira, had unemployment rates below the State's unemployment rate in November 2024.

The unemployment rate in the Southern Tier decreased over the past year


Unemployment Rate by Place, November 2024





US Census Bureau Diversity Index Scores, 2010 and 2020







Regional Labor Market Developments

Good news

Binghamton University (BU) will attempt to bridge the gap in mental health care in Chenango County, thanks to a \$4.5 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education. The grant money will be distributed through the Binghamton University Community Schools (BUCS) group over a five-year period and is earmarked to provide social work support to those in the Norwich and Oxford school districts in Chenango County. BUCS intends to serve 2,310 students and their families, according to an article posted on binghamtonhomepage.com. These services are sorely needed in these communities as demand far outpaces organizational supply. BUCS expects to roll out the mental health programming in 2025.

Broome County and the City of Elmira (Chemung County) are taking advantage of New York State-offered funds to expand their stock of affordable housing. As stated in the Elmira StarGazette, these communities are tapping into Vacant Rental Improvement Program funds, which were designed to restore vacant units and underutilized buildings into affordable housing for income-eligible tenants in communities across the state, outside of New York City. The effort is anticipated to bring 36 additional apartments to market in the targeted geographies.

A one-time powerplant in Binghamton (Broome County) is being turned into a high efficiency building panel production plant. Firomar is moving its operation from Connecticut to New York to be closer to the expanding market for its products. The increasing demand for clean energy building components coincides closely with New York State's carbon release reduction goals. The business expects to employ around 40 people as it comes online in early 2025 and hopes to grow to a 100-person workforce once the plant relocation process is completed. Firomar is anticipated to invest a total of \$4.6 million in the project, largely associated with refurbishing the standing structure and purchasing new production equipment.
