

Southern Tier Jobs



In February 2024, there were 212,500 private sector jobs and 268,400 nonfarm (private + government) jobs in the region.

Job Gains




The region gained 2,200 nonfarm jobs over the past year, including 700 private sector jobs and 1,500 government jobs.

Regional Industry Mix, February 2024










The unemployment rate in the Southern Tier increased over the past year






Unemployment Rates(Not Seasonally Adjusted), 2014-2024

February Unemployment Rates, 2014 to 2024







US Census Bureau Diversity Index Scores, 2010 and 2020





Distribution of Population 25 years and over by Educational Attainment, 2022



Regional Labor Market Developments

Good news

Binghamton University (Broome County), in partnership with a host of business and research partners across upstate New York, is in line for up to \$160 million in federal funding over the next 10 years. The National Science Foundation (NSF) Engines program will support battery and energy storage advances. These potential funds will accompany more than \$113 million announced in 2022 for Binghamton to establish its battery manufacturing and innovation hub, according to an article in the Central NY Business Journal.

Two projects in the Southern Tier Region were recipients of Focused Attraction of Shovel-Ready Tracts New York (FAST NY) grant program funds. According to a press release from Governor Hochul, FAST NY is designed to prepare and develop sites across the state to jumpstart New York's shovel-readiness and increase its attractiveness to large employers and high-tech manufacturing companies. Broome County was given \$11.3 million to bring a former industrial site in Johnson City back online for development, while Chemung County was awarded \$4 million in funding to assist in site remediation and upgrades at a location in Horseheads.

Cayuga Medical Center in Ithaca (Tompkins County) received \$10.45 million in Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) grant monies to make enhancements to the facility's energy infrastructure. According to a Cayuga Medical official, the funds will be used to install two 2,000-kW emergency generators and a 20,000-gallon underground storage tank and also to construct a new building to house the generators to maintain power levels at the Medical Center during adverse weather events.

Bad news

According to a WARN notice, Corning Inc. will lay off 107 workers at its diesel emissions control production facility in Erwin (Steuben County) due to "economic" reasons. The layoffs are scheduled to occur in May 2024 and represent 20% of the current workforce count at the production site.
