

Southern Tier Jobs



In October 2024, there were 217,700 private sector jobs and 274,600 nonfarm (private + government) jobs in the region.

Job Gains




The region gained 700 nonfarm jobs over the past year, with a gain of 1,200 government jobs offset by a loss of 500 private sector jobs.

Regional Industry Mix, October 2024





Unemployment Rate





The State's unemployment rate (4.1%) exceeds the region's unemployment rate (3.3%) by 0.8 percentage points.


The unemployment rate in the Southern Tier decreased over the past year





US Census Bureau Diversity Index Scores, 2010 and 2020





Distribution of Population 25 years and over by Educational Attainment, 2023





Regional Labor Market Developments

Good news

Corning Inc., with headquarters in Corning, NY (Steuben County), entered into a sizeable agreement with multinational telecommunications company AT&T. According to a joint business media release, the multi-year agreement, valued at around \$1 billion, calls for Corning Inc. to deliver next-generation fiber, cable and connectivity solutions to support the expansion of AT&T's fiber network and help bring high-speed internet to more Americans.

Corning Museum of Glass (CMoG) celebrated the opening of its state-of-the-art glassmaking facility in Corning (Steuben County). The 60,000-square-foot space took two and a half years to complete and came with a \$55.3 million price tag. The money for the project came from a years-long capital campaign. CMoG's president and CEO stated that the project created the only facility in North America that can support the creation of large-scale works in cast glass, while expanding glassmaking education programs, creating more and longer residency opportunities and adding the capacity to serve twice as many museum visitors.

A partnership between Alstom, Norfolk Southern Railway, and Binghamton University's New Energy New York consortium has been created to explore the potential of hybrid, battery-powered trains. Sixteen million dollars in federal funds have been earmarked for the project. The federal funds will be coming from the U.S. Department of Transportation's Consolidated Rail Infrastructure and Safety Improvements program. The Binghamton Press and Sun Bulletin reports that two hybrid battery-diesel locomotives will be produced in the Southern Tier as a result of the arrangement. They will be tested at Alstom's Kanona facility in Bath (Steuben County).
