Job Gains




The region gained 5,700 nonfarm jobs over the past year, including 5,100 private sector jobs and 600 government jobs.

Regional Industry Mix, September 2024







September Unemployment Rates, 2014 to 2024







US Census Bureau Diversity Index Scores, 2010 and 2020







Regional Labor Market Developments

Good news

Lancaster-based company Upstate Niagara Cooperative is getting \$9.9 million in tax breaks from the Erie County Industrial Development Agency for a \$150 million project to double the dairy production capacity at its West Seneca (Erie County) operation. The company is planning to construct a 250,000-square-foot addition to its facility. The project includes \$67 million for the building and \$90 million in new equipment. Currently, the company employs 240 workers but would hire another 130 within two years of the project's completion. Officials are targeting initial occupancy by late November 2025, with full completion by the end of 2026, according to the Buffalo News.

Amazon's \$550 million, 3.1 million-square-foot fulfillment center in the Town of Niagara (Niagara County) has the steel framing up, according to the latest update from the company. Construction began in March 2024. The five-story Amazon Robotics Sortable (ARS) fulfillment center is expected to open in 2026 and provide 1,000 jobs, according to Business First. The center will be the company's fourth, and second largest in New York State, ARS fulfillment center when finished.

Since 2013, TM Montante has been developing the former Millard Fillmore Gates Circle Homeopathic Hospital in Williamsville (Erie County) into Lancaster Square, which the company describes as "a vibrant, mixed-use, urban space featuring neighborhood retail, modern residential units, and commercial office space," incorporating a \$35.5 million, 80-unit affordable housing project. The next phase of the project, focused on the affordable housing portion, is ready to begin. An affiliate of Belmont Housing Resources for Western New York purchased part of the property for \$1.65 million and has received financing for its phase of the Lancaster Square project. Construction is expected to take about 20 months, and the end result will be a mix of affordable apartments ranging from studios to three-bedroom units. Since acquiring the hospital site, TM Montante and its partners have completed several projects, including the Canterbury Woods Senior housing development, Linwood Lafayette Senior Apartments and mixed-use projects. While Belmont is renovating the northern portion of the complex, TM Montante plans to convert the southern portion into a market-rate apartment community, but this project is on hold due to high interest rates and project costs but will move forward as soon as the market improves, according to Business First.

Basil Ford has opened its \$6 million truck and fleet service center in Cheektowaga (Erie County). The dealership renovated the former AMF Thruway Lanes property into the Ford Pro Elite Commercial Service center for larger vehicles, according to Business First. The 40,000-square-foot facility has 30 bays with big lifts needed for dump trucks, commercial vans, flatbed trucks, ambulances, motor homes and shuttle buses. The company had operated a commercial truck shop with eight bays on Walden Avenue but has moved that operation to the new facility. The former truck shop will now become the company's "quick-lane" shop for oil changes, brakes and inspections, according to Business First. About 65 people work in the repair shop now, and the company is still looking to hire at least six or seven more truck technicians.

Harry Stinson, the Canadian owner of the fire-damaged Buffalo Grand Hotel (Erie County), hopes to reopen its nearly 500 guest rooms in time for spring 2025. Stinson has been struggling to reopen the hotel for several years since he purchased the former Adam' Mark Hotel from Visions for \$17 million. He spent over \$24 million on renovations. Then, not only did the COVID-19 pandemic hurt hotels as he was about to unveil the renovations, but at the end of 2021 an arsonist set fire to rolls of plastic wrapped carpet that were set to be installed, causing a three-alarm fire that ripped through the newly renovated banquet center, according to the Buffalo News. A multi-million-dollar insurance settlement from the fire enabled Stinson to stay out of foreclosure, also according to The Buffalo News. Stinson would not disclose the amount he received from the insurance company for his \$50 million claim for damages sustained from the fire, but it was at least enough to pay off the mortgage, satisfy the \$20.44 million debt owed to Corning-based Visions Hotels and allow the project to progress.

The Marriott Courtyard in Niagara Falls (Niagara County) is planning a \$14.3 million expansion that will add 84 more guest rooms and an expanded entrance and lobby, more than doubling guest room space. The project calls for a four-story, 50,000-square-foot addition to the existing 70,000-square-foot building that was built in 1912 as a chocolate factory. The existing Starbucks in the lobby will remain. The owner is looking for a restaurant partner to take over the existing bar and bistro space to create expanded food and beverage service for the entire property, according to Business First. The expansion project would begin with the 50,000-square-foot addition, pending approvals from the city. A second phase to the project would consist of renovations to the existing rooms. The entire project is expected to take about 24 months to complete.

Earlier this month, MG2 Corp., a Seattle-based global architecture and design firm that has partnered with Costco Wholesale Corp., filed a building permit application with the Amherst Building Department to construct a Costco (the Buffalo area's first) in Amherst (Erie County), according to Business First. The retail warehouse will cost nearly \$22.5 million to build, according to the application. It takes about 110 days from the time construction starts for the new Costco to open, based on MG2's website. News of the project first broke in spring 2022.

The Kenan Center in Lockport (Niagara County) plans to break ground next year on a \$15 million, 72,000-square-foot arena to replace the existing facility, which was built over 50 years ago. Plans for the new arena began to take shape before the pandemic, and the center has been raising money over the past two years. Construction is expected to begin in the spring of 2025 with plans to open in 2026, according to the Business First.

Regional Labor Market Developments

Good news continued

Ellicott Development Co. has proposed a \$70 million project in Chautauqua County to turn the former Chautauqua Point Golf Course into Sunset View at Point Chautauqua. The project would consist of a market-rate housing development with townhomes, condominiums and single-family homes. The resort-style community on Chautauqua Lake would include three separate sections and would be constructed in multiple phases over several years, largely based on market demand. The property will also feature a restaurant, bar, community center, waterfront access with a pavilion, dock, boat slips and watercraft rentals. If all goes according to plan, officials hope to begin construction by early next year.

The Erie County Industrial Development Agency (IDA) recently approved another \$541,844 in sales tax breaks for what is now a \$45.3 million construction project of Zephyr Partners new pot farm in South Buffalo (Erie County). The company needed the extra tax breaks to offset skyrocketing construction costs and changes to the design of the interior space. Zephyr has already obtained \$2.12 million in property tax breaks over 15 years and a \$120,000 mortgage-recording tax abatement in 2022 and now has \$1.63 million in sales tax relief. The multiphase development could ultimately create more than 1.25 million square feet of growing, production and distribution space over time as the cannabis market in New York expands. For now, the primary tenant will be Toronto-based RIV Capital in a pair of one-story buildings totaling about 75,000 square feet, which will sublease it to its own subsidiary Etain LLC, which holds the state-issued marijuana licenses for production and sales. The project will create 20 full- and 34 part-time jobs within two years, with completion of the buildings expected by March 2025. Plans call for further expansion with three buildings for cultivation and manufacturing, according to the Buffalo News.

MN8 Energy, a New York-based renewable energy company, is planning to operate a battery storage facility at the long-abandoned Polymer Applications site in the Town of Tonawanda (Erie County). The site is a federal Superfund site that has been cleared and cleaned following a fire 35 years ago, according to the Buffalo News. The company installs solar power, battery storage and electric vehicle charging stations for over 200 corporations, government entities, schools and utilities. The company has signed a lease for the 6.5-acre site and will have a three-year option period to complete an interconnection study with the New York Independent System operator to determine if and how its battery could link up with the regional electric grid. If the results are positive, it would then be able to lease the property for 20 years.
