#### **Integrated Resource Teams**

Integrated Resource Teams (IRTs) is a self-advocacy approach for both young people and adults to work toward their future goals. IRTs align all the partners and supports a person needs to help identify dreams and turn them into goals with actionable steps for success.

#### Harness the power of IRTs:

- Coordinate resources, funding, and expertise to solve challenges.
- Create substantial employment outcomes for mutual customers.
- Reduce staff time needed to effectively implement service plans.
- Promote systems change.

#### **Partnership for Inclusive Internships (PII)**

Partnership for Inclusive Internships (PII) is a new program that fosters diversity and inclusive hiring, helping people with disabilities gain access to internships in State government, and eventually permanent employment. It is modeled after the successful PII program in New York City.

Internships can be developed around a meaningful need, project, or in-demand job in any State agency where the intern will be a valuable resource while sharpening job specific and soft skills essential to career success.

The little things go a long way in building trusting relationships with youth... Making a five-minute phone call to check on a new parenting youth; attending a graduation ceremony; having snacks and regular access to food available; responding to body language; friendly conversation over lunch; making it ok to reassess and change direction; giving incentives like gift cards; interacting at their level; providing interview clothes; leveraging personal relationships to involve partners like labor unions, employers, and food pantries; creating warm and inviting youth spaces in your office.

We get cooperation and engagement from our youth by simply listening to them, taking an interest, and paying attention. We can usually deliver services to them just through having a conversation.

## **An Investment Boom That Needs Young People**



The webinar is about how LWDBs can collaborate to support the implementation of the Investing in America Agenda (IAA) while also supporting the needs of youth. The IAA will leverage billions of dollars in public and private sector investments, creating hundreds of thousands of jobs in:

- > High-speed internet
- > Clean energy, solar & wind
- Water quality & infrastructure
- > Home energy efficiency & weatherization
- > Battery & electric vehicle
- > Road, bridges, airports & public
- Semiconductors & electronics


So how do we know what opportunities exist? An interactive map at <u>invest.gov</u> shows public and private investments. Click the dots in your region to immediately see the project name, funding agency and amount.

Then – and this is the important part – **contact your Department of Transportation (DOT), county executives, and other local elected officials to start talking about how you can connect youth with these opportunities.** Much of the IAA funding hasn't been deployed yet and now's the time to start building the ecosystems that will support this movement.


energy projects underway in 2024.



#### Statewide and Regional Data on Youth Ages 16-24


