In March 2024, there were 431,900 private sector jobs and 553,800 nonfarm (private + government) jobs in the region.

Job Gains




The region gained 8,800 nonfarm jobs over the past year, including 5,600 private sector jobs and 3,200 government jobs.

Regional Industry Mix, March 2024









The cities of Albany, Schenectady, and Troy had unemployment rates above the State's unemployment rate in March 2024.

The unemployment rate in the Capital Region increased over the past year






Unemployment Rates(Not Seasonally Adjusted), 2014-2024

March Unemployment Rates, 2014 to 2024







Distribution of Capital Region Population by Race/Ethnicity, 2010 and 2020


Capital Region's Diversity Index increased by 42% from 2010 to 2020

Regional Labor Market Developments

Good news

Active Solar Development is downsizing its new headquarters in Malta (Saratoga County) but anticipates creating more jobs than originally projected. According to documents provided to the Saratoga County Industrial Development Authority (IDA), Active Solar Development had 60 employees in November 2023, 15 more than originally projected back in 2022. The company anticipates its employment count to be at 75 in 2024, 85 in 2025 and 90 in 2026. Active Solar Development designs and builds large solar power projects in the northeastern U.S. The decision to downsize the new facility was a result of higher than anticipated construction costs.

National retailer Burlington, formerly known as Burlington Coat Factory, is opening its fourth Capital Region store in Albany (Albany County). The new store, slated to open May 3, 2024, will be located at the Northway Shopping Center on Central Avenue in Albany, in the building formerly occupied by Buy Baby. Burlington purchased 44 Bed Bath & Beyond and Buy Buy Baby property leases that were part of a bankruptcy filing. Burlington opened 80 new stores in 2023 and plans to open 140 new stores in 2024.

Bad news

Norlite, a manufacturer of construction materials, is temporarily shutting down its Cohoes (Albany County) plant. As a result, they will be furloughing 28 workers while the company inspects and repairs worksite equipment. International Union of Operating Engineers (IUOE) Local 158 represents workers at the Cohoes plant. According to a union spokesperson, about 50 workers are employed at the plant during peak operations. Speaking with the Albany Times Union, the spokesperson noted that some workers were laid off for a 90-day period, while a small workforce remains at the Cohoes plant during the shutdown. IUOE is planning to assist affected workers to find new jobs during the temporary shutdown. Rapid Response and Business Services are also working with Norlite to assist employees during the closure.

Video game maker Velan Studios announced plans to lay off 46 employees following the loss of a major development contract. Following a 60-day period, the layoffs would be effective on May 18, 2024. The company does hope to receive additional work prior to that date which would reduce the total number of affected workers. The Troy-based company (Rensselaer County) also announced the contract loss would result in halting its plans for an expansion in Montreal.
